(Biodiversity and Deforestation Policy)

2025.5

1. Purpose

This policy aims to establish a framework for protecting and enhancing biodiversity and forests across all business activities. It seeks to assess and evaluate risks related to biodiversity degradation and forest destruction that may arise in procurement, production, distribution, and sales processes. Additionally, it outlines principles and actionable measures to conserve, restore, and expand biodiversity in local communities.

2. Policy

Hanwha Advanced Materials supports domestic and international laws and regulations related to biodiversity and wildlife protection, as well as global initiatives for biodiversity conservation, such as the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Protected Areas Categories (IUCN Category I-V). Through the establishment of this biodiversity protection policy, we promote activities to protect biodiversity and mitigate biodiversity-related risks.

1) Internationally Protected Areas (IUCN Category Ia, etc.)

Areas where a natural ecosystem recognized by the international community has been established and where a variety of species thrive, which can be destroyed by even minimal human impact.

2) Wilderness Areas (IUCN Category Ib, etc.)

Areas maintaining pristine wilderness ecosystems and inhabited by indigenous communities preserving traditional lifestyles, allowing minimal human impact for educational or scientific purposes

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3) National Protected Areas (IUCN Category II, etc.)

Areas designated by nations to permanently preserve natural ecosystem processes, protecting native flora and fauna, and holding significant value for spiritual, scientific, educational, and tourism purposes

4) Natural and Cultural Monument Areas (IUCN Category III, etc.)

Naturally formed ecosystems or those shaped by cultural or spiritual influences, holding high archaeological, anthropological, historical, or geographical value

5) Species/Habitat Management Areas (IUCN Category IV, etc.)

Areas designated by international, national, or local authorities for the protection of species and habitats, requiring active management or intervention to enhance biodiversity.

3. Management and Implementation Framework

- 1) Identify potential impacts on biodiversity and forests at all stages of business operations, strive to prevent or minimize such impacts, and endeavor to restore any damage to biodiversity or forests caused by operations.
- 2) Identify threats to endangered species found within the premises of our business sites or those of our partners and develop strategies to conserve these species.
- 3) Designate and monitor areas directly or indirectly affected by business activities, assessing and managing their impacts on forests.
- 4) Establish procedures and governance systems to consistently consider biodiversity and forest destruction issues in business strategies,

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decision-making processes, and long-term risk analyses.

- 5) Integrate biodiversity management and forest conservation into the company's environmental management system, setting goals and standards for control and monitoring.

4. Education and Dissemination

- 1) Hanwha Advanced Materials conducts regular biodiversity training for employees to raise awareness about the importance of biodiversity conservation, protection, and expansion.
- 2) Information on biodiversity protection activities and outcomes is disclosed through the company's website, sustainability reports, and other channels.

5. Supplementary Provisions

This Biodiversity and Deforestation Policy is enacted and effective as of 07/01/2025.
