<Conflict Minerals Policy>

1. We recognize the human rights violations and environmental damage caused by mineral extraction in conflict and high-risk areas as a very serious issue, and we implement policies to prevent them.
2. We strive to fulfill our responsibilities as a global company for a sustainable future by actively participating in the prohibition of conflict minerals and responsible sourcing.
3. We establish a responsible supply chain management system and encourage the participation of our suppliers to minimize human rights violations and environmental damage.
4. We comply with all laws and other requirements related to conflict minerals and continuously improve our management system.

1. Conflict Minerals

Hanwha Advanced Materials recognizes the existence of conflict minerals that are unethically mined and distributed—such as through human rights violations and environmental destruction—in conflict-affected areas, including the Democratic Republic of the Congo and nine neighboring countries in Africa. Accordingly, the company strictly prohibits the use of conflict minerals (tin, tantalum, tungsten, and gold) that are mined under unethical conditions (e.g., human rights abuses, child labor, environmental harm) in such regions. We also remain committed to continuously monitoring newly identified conflict minerals and reviewing additional measures for appropriate response.

2. Implementation Plan

- 1) Hanwha Advanced Materials prohibits the use of conflict minerals.
- 2) When purchasing materials that may contain potential conflict minerals

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(e.g., tin, tantalum, tungsten, gold), the company requires all suppliers to confirm the non-use of conflict minerals.

- 3) We continuously monitor emerging conflict minerals and implement responsible sourcing policies to fulfill our social and ethical responsibilities.
